

Scott Grimes:

One of the most decorated offensive players in the short history of the York Revolution, Kennett Square native Scott Grimes has been a centerpiece in the Revs' back-to-back championship runs of the last two seasons.

In 2010, Grimes enjoyed one of the greatest single seasons of any player in Atlantic League history and became the first in Revs history to be named Atlantic League Player of the Year. Grimes led all of professional baseball in runs scored that season with an independent baseball-record 138 runs in just 132 games. For good measure, Grimes scored the winning run in the 10th inning of Game 3 of the Atlantic League Championship Series, the run that proved to be the clincher in the Revs' first league title.

Overall, Grimes hit .312 with 17 homeruns and set a club record with 28 stolen bases in 2010. Those numbers earned him Atlantic League mid and postseason All-Star accolades as well as a spot on Baseball America's All-Independent First Team.

Grimes returned to York in 2011 and again led the league in runs scored, crossing the plate another 97 times, while connecting on 15 homers and stealing 21 bases. He enjoyed one of his greatest nights on September 15, when he celebrated his 28th birthday by becoming the first player in Revs history to hit for the cycle, helping York clinch a playoff spot with their victory over Bridgeport at Sovereign Bank Stadium.

Grimes played his college ball at Keystone (PA) College, before signing his first pro contract with the Can-Am League's all-travel Grays in 2005. Grimes spent his first four seasons in the Can-Am League and was named that league's Player of the Year in 2008 with Worcester after batting .365 with 21 homeruns and setting that league's runs record with 87 runs scored in 93 games. His performance earned him an affiliated contract with the New York Mets organization in 2009.

After two seasons in York, Grimes is the Revs' all-time leader in runs (235), stolen bases (49) and outfield assists (25), and ranks fourth in club history in homeruns (32).
